Train to teach: becoming a primary school teacher

Our School Direct primary programme is structured to ensure that you develop the skills and knowledge required to succeed in the primary school environment.

On our bespoke course you will gain the right skills, knowledge and attributes to become an outstanding teacher specialising in Early Years and Key Stage 1, or Key Stage 1 and 2. The course provides a comprehensive knowledge of the National Curriculum and core subjects, English, Mathematics and Science. As part of this, you will also explore important topics such as inclusion, behaviour management, assessment and phonics.

We focus on developing happy, healthy teachers and your course will look at equally important aspects including managing stress and achieving a work-life balance.



Core aspects of the programme include:

- Choice of specialising in either 3-4 years (EYFS / KS1) or 5-11 years (KS1 /KS2).
- Placement in a high quality school with support from a dedicated mentor, plus a placement in a second school. This gives you a contrasting experience, and develops your skills and knowledge.
- Weekly learning and training, with assignments. As well as securing your QTS, you will achieve a PGCE with 60 credits towards a Masters qualification. You will cover all aspects of education and pedagogy in your training. Some examples include behaviour for learning, how to prepare, plan and structure lessons, questioning techniques, demonstrating progress and co-operative learning strategies.
- Secondary and Early Years experience. These enhance your wider knowledge around areas such as transition.
- Study in all aspects of what makes a successful teacher. This will include the National Curriculum and important aspects such as Special Educational Needs (SEND), managing stress and achieving a work-life balance.
- You will learn alongside fellow primary trainees, within small groups. Your teaching load increases in line with your learning, giving you the confidence you need to succeed.
- Learning is delivered through workshops, tutorials and lectures, some with guest speakers, and through group work with other teacher trainees from a variety of subject specialisms.

Should I have experience working in a primary school before applying?

Although School Experience is not required for TIE's School Direct programme, we strongly recommend it. Any prior experience will support answers to key questions during the interview and, of course, it is a vital part of confirming that teaching is the career for you!

Important notice:

Although applications are taken from when the DfE apply window opens until it closes (usually October – mid July), the number of primary places are allocated. This means once our places are filled with successful applicants, we are unable to offer any further places. Early application is therefore encouraged.



Train to teach: becoming a secondary school teacher

We offer a range of secondary based School Direct places across all subjects.

The list of subjects on offer are shown below. Some of these subjects are considered shortage subjects, and trainees who meet the criteria are able to apply for a salaried place. Further information can be found on page 10.

What subjects can I choose to train to teach in?

*Sciences require at least 2 A-levels and a relevant degree to access these courses. Please contact us for advice and support.

Do I need a degree in the subject you wish to teach?

If you do not have a degree in the subject you wish to teach, a Subject Knowledge Enhancement (SKE) programme can help. Excluding Science, your degree can be in any subject, as long as it meets the generic entry requirements (see page 9). All of the SKE programme concentrates on ensuring you have the right subject knowledge.

TIE is a rapidly expanding institution and amongst the largest in the region. Our list of partner schools is constantly evolving. A key priority for us is not only ensuring that trainees become qualified and are on the journey to be outstanding, but quickly secure employment. Important notice:

Although applications are taken from when the annual DfE application window opens until it closes, available places have nationally defined caps. Certain subjects such as PE are expected to fill very quickly. We strongly advise if you are considering applying for this subject, you do so at the earliest opportunity.

Application criteria

TIE is looking to recruit trainee primary and secondary teachers with the potential to become outstanding. As an institute, we support you on the journey to achieving this.

Applications are initially made via DfE Teacher Training; should you meet the minimum criteria, you will be invited to interview with our panel. The minimum requirements are detailed below. Please do contact us for further information or guidance.

Qualifications and experience:

- Degree 2:2 or above (or equivalent).
- Minimum of 2 A*- C grade GCSEs at grade C/level 4 or above including Mathematics and English Language. The same is required in Science for primary.
- · Strong subject knowledge.
- Knowledge of issues linked to education. School experience is advised but not required.

Personal qualities:

- Enjoyment of working with children and young people. Commitment to a career in teaching.
- Reflection on previous experience in school.
- Effective communication skills including use of written and spoken English.
- Excellent interpersonal skills. Leadership potential.
- Initiative
- Ability to relate to and engage with young people.
- A range of personal characteristics including flexibility, communication, independence and resilience.
- · Ability to explain concepts clearly.
- · Ability to work effectively as part of a group.

In addition all applicants will also need to:

- Demonstrate a passion for working with young people, not just a passion for their subject(s).
- Be able to evidence why teaching is the right career for them.
- Complete a declaration regarding any criminal convictions, have a satisfactory Disclosure and Barring Service check (DBS) and satisfactory references, ensuring their suitability to work with young people.
- Any applicants with overseas qualifications must provide a ENIC comparability certificate. This can be obtained from: www.enic.org.uk

School Direct is an investment in your future and the start of your future career. We understand that you may be leaving paid employment to train, and there is a range of financial and other support available from TIE.

Salaried places

Our salaried places are funded by Government, and therefore are linked to subjects that are considered to need to attract more high-calibre professionals to teach them. Our salaried places include Maths, Physics and Chemistry.. These are highly competitive and early application is advised.

The Government attach set criteria to these posts including 3 years' work experience e.g. accountancy would be considered experience for Maths or a pharmacist for Biology. There are a range of attractive bursaries available, and we recommend that you contact us to discuss this and receive support with your application. Please note that with the range of support available for some unsalaried places, it is often worth researching both routes. Please contact us for further advice and support.


Help with the costs of tuition and living expenses

A School Direct place costs £9,250 and is payable in three instalments across the academic year. Non-salaried trainees can make an application for a Student Loan to cover the costs of tuition and living expenses where necessary. There is a wide range of bursaries and scholarships available – visit the Get into Teaching website for advice. We are happy to provide help and support.



Some of the additional ways we support trainees include:

- Pre-placement induction. We run a Flying Start Induction Week prior to the Summer prior to the Summer where you will meet some of your colleagues and learn more about the year ahead.
- Employment support. All of our trainees are highly employable, and our partners take part in the programme as part of their own recruitment strategies. Nine in ten trainees on average secure employment prior to course completion.
- A dedicated team. We understand that it can feel like a big decision to train to teach. We support our trainees on every step of their journey from pre-application to training and starting their first teaching role.
- Ongoing communication and support. Once you apply, you will receive regular updates on what to expect along with top tips and ways for which you can prepare for success in your teaching career.




Case study: applying for a salaried place.

Veronica Mollitt

For the past six years I have had the pleasure of working with students who struggle to access mainstream learning environments, either due to special educational needs or lower academic attainment in primary schools. Before starting my teacher training year, I was a HLTA and adored every minute of it. But, after 6 years I wanted to further my educational experience and step into the shoes of a teacher. Due to personal circumstances, I could not take a pay drop and decided that with my 6 years' experience within education, I was eligible to apply for a salaried route into teaching.

I have always been passionate about English Language and Literature, studying to a degree level, I believe my enthusiasm for the subject has been an essential way for me to ensure students engage with activities. The subject has a freedom which has always appealed to me. Prior to joining my current school, I had worked in a business environment which involved data management and interpretation, meeting deadlines and managing fluctuating workload, skills which have proven critical in the school environment.

Outside of work commitments, I have been regularly involved in a PTA group for my daughter's primary school which has allowed me to understand the struggles faced in primary education settings and keep up to date with important community issues such as service cuts, changes to LA strategies and new projects. This helped me to appreciate the issues that can affect families in the area around my school, making me more mindful of how to approach struggling students. I have loved every minute of training to be a teacher. It is hard work, but worth it! If I were to give any advice, it would be to be organised!
